Meeting on Niles Canyon Highway Widening – October 14

Caltrans' highway widening project is back, in a different form. Caltrans is now proposing the Niles Canyon Safety Improvements Project. Caltrans describes the project as implementing "multiple spot safety improvements" on State Route 84 from Mission Boulevard to Interstate 680. This project will involve: major construction and tree cutting at the low-speed curve; cable netting and rock fall fencing in the western portion of the canyon; 6,000 feet of highway widening; two traffic signals in Sunol; railing replacements and upgrades; removal of the Stonybrook Creek box culvert; and removal of 35 trees and relocation of 17 utility poles next to the roadway.

The scoping comment period is through October 30. Caltrans will then prepare an Environmental Impact Report for the project. There will be a public scoping hearing in Sunol the evening of Wednesday, October 14, to provide updated information about the safety improvements planned to date and considerations in forming the range of possible alternatives to be evaluated in the EIR. The meeting will include a brief presentation at 6:30 pm followed by an opportunity to provide verbal or written comments to Caltrans staff.

Stonybrook Creek Fish Passage Project Underway

The Alameda County Resource Conservation District has begun construction on the Stonybrook Creek Crossings and Fish Passage Improvement Project, to improve fish passage at two

Alameda County owned culverts in lower Stonybrook Creek along Palomares Road. Baffles have been installed in the lowermost culvert at milepost 8.75 and the creek channel has been regraded to remove a boulder jam above the culvert. A culvert upstream at milepost 8.60 will be replaced with a bridge, but construction has been delayed until June 2016. More info here: http://www.acrcd.org/NewsEvents/ProjectNotices.aspx

Sunol Ag Park Reprieve

The SFPUC has announced a re-design of the Sunol corporation yard to avoid any encroachment into the organic farmland at the Sunol AgPark. The SFPUC responded to concerns from SAGE, the Sunol AgPark farmers, Save Our Sunol, and the Alameda Creek Alliance regarding impacts to the Sunol AgPark and prime farm land.

The SFPUC has confirmed that the project will not use any temporary or permanent storage space in the Sunol AgPark directly south of the existing Sunol Yard. The SFPUC will move forward with the Sunol Corporation Yard and Watershed Center project as proposed in the previously released Mitigated Negative Declaration. The SFPUC proposes to site temporary staff and equipment activities in a 4-acre area in the southeast quadrant of the Paloma Road/ Temple Road intersection during construction. This parcel is presently part of a buffer around an aggregate-mining lease. The SFPUC will use the existing Sunol Yard footprint as best they can to accommodate staff and operational needs - any additional future needs will be reassessed after construction of the currently proposed project. The SFPUC has also initiated discussions with SAGE to extend their lease, which will expire in March 2016, to provide certainty to the farmers as part of their ongoing efforts to manage the AgPark.

Little Yosemite Project Delayed To Protect Rare Frogs

The SFPUC has decided to withdraw its environmental evaluation application for the controversial Little Yosemite Fish Passage Project along upper Alameda Creek in Sunol Regional Wilderness, due to concerns over significant impacts to endangered frogs. The project is intended to improve upstream passage conditions for migrating steelhead trout through the natural boulder cascades in Little Yosemite. The SFPUC will drop the Mitigated Negative Declaration for the project and will work with agencies and frog experts to re-evaluate the project.
