Earth Day Restoration along Alameda Creek - April 25

Join fellow Alliance members as we continue stewardship at our adopted stretch of Alameda Creek in Niles on Saturday, April 25, from 10 am to noon.

We'll continue our focus on Cape and English ivy removal at the site, and discuss how these efforts protect and enhance fish and wildlife habitat. Come and enjoy a couple hours working with us along a beautiful reach of Alameda Creek!

We'll meet at 10am at the Niles Staging Area Parking lot along Old Canyon Road near Canyon Oaks Court in the Niles area of Fremont (roughly 720 Old Canyon Rd). We'll take a short walk upstream, where we'll perform habitat enhancement work until about noon. We'll provide gloves, waste bags, tools, water, and a snack. Please wear work clothes - including long pants and sturdy, closed-toe shoes that can get dirty. The work isn't on much of a slope, but the ground can be uneven and the work can be dusty. There is poison oak nearby but not in the immediate area where we'll be working. However, a long-sleeve shirt and hat are recommended. Please bring your own re-usable water bottle to fill.

Do You Need A Permit To Work Near the Creek?

The San Francisco Regional Water Quality Control Board has updated and clarified their guidelines on best management practices and permit requirements for stream maintenance and enhancement projects, and specifically what activities are allowed with and without a Water Board permit. Some activities that do <u>not</u> require permits or prior notice to the Water Board include:

- Collecting and removing trash, as long as the trash is not embedded in stream beds or banks.
- Removing properly identified non-native invasive plants by hand without the use of any machinery or power saws.
- Planting appropriate native vegetation by hand with minimal soil disturbance.
- Fencing of riparian corridors to protect stream banks from livestock damage.
- Removing graffiti, as long as the cleaning agent is non-toxic and efforts are made to keep the cleaning products from discharging to surface water.
