Steelhead Trout Back In Lower Alameda Creek

Members of the Alameda Creek Alliance spotted two adult steelhead trout on March 10 in the lower Alameda Creek flood control channel, below an impassable concrete barrier across the creek in Fremont that blocks their spawning migration. The identification of steelhead trout, a federally protected threatened species, was confirmed by a fisheries biologist with the East Bay Regional Park District. Although there have been possible sightings of steelhead in lower Alameda Creek in March 2012 and April 2010, these are the first confirmed steelhead since a single pair of fish, aided upstream by volunteers, spawned in March 2008 in the Stonybrook Creek tributary in Niles Canyon.

On March 15, Alameda Creek Alliance volunteers went out to the creek with East Bay Regional Park District staff to attempt to capture and tag the steelhead. With the cooperation of the Alameda County Water District, we netted fish below the BART weir. We were unable to catch any steelhead, but did capture more than 20 native Pacific lamprey as well as a few species of native warm water fish. There were at least 50-100 lamprey below the BART weir trying to get upstream to spawn. We will make another attempt to catch the steelhead, likely later this week.
